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troubling vision addresses american culture s fixation on black visibility exploring how blackness is persistently seen as a problem in public culture and even in black scholarship that challenges racist discourse through trenchant analysis nicole r fleetwood reorients the problem of black visibility by turning attention to what it means to see blackness and to the performative codes that reinforce resignify and disrupt its meaning working across visual theory and performance studies fleetwood asks how is the black body visualized as both familiar and disruptive how might we investigate the black body as a troubling presence to the scopic regimes that define it as such how is value assessed based on visible blackness fleetwood documents multiple forms of engagement with the visual even as she meticulously underscores how the terms of engagement change in various performative contexts examining a range of practices from the documentary photography of charles teenie harris to

the excess flesh performances of black female artists and pop stars to the media art of fatimah tuggar to the iconicity of michael jackson fleetwood reveals and reconfigures the mechanics codes and metaphors of blackness in visual culture troubling vision is a path breaking book that examines the problem of seeing blackness the simultaneous hyper visibility and invisibility of african americans in us visual culture in the last half century weaving together critical modes and methodologies from performance studies art history critical race studies visual culture analysis and gender theory fleetwood expands du bois s idea of double vision into a broad questioning of whether representation itself will resolve the problem of the black body in the field of vision with skilled attention to historical contexts documentary practices and media forms she takes up the works of a broad variety of cultural producers from photographers and playwrights to musicians and visual artists and examines black spectatorship as well as black spectacle in chapters on the trope of non iconicity in the photographs of charles teenie harris the visible seams in the digital images of the artist fatimah tuggar and a coda on the un dead michael jackson fleetwood s close analyses soar troubling vision is a beautifully written original and important addition to the field of american studies announcement of the american studies association for the 2012 lora romero first book publication prize

in film blackness michael boyce gillespie shifts the ways we think about black film treating it not as a category a genre or strictly a representation of the black experience but as a visual negotiation between film as art and the discursivity of race gillespie challenges expectations that black film can or should represent the reality of black life or provide answers to social problems instead he frames black film alongside literature music art photography and new media treating it as an interdisciplinary form that enacts black visual and expressive culture gillespie discusses the racial grotesque in ralph bakshi s coonskin 1975 black performativity in wendell b harris jr s chameleon street 1989 blackness and noir in bill duke s deep cover 1992 and how place and desire impact blackness in barry jenkins s medicine for melancholy 2008 considering how each film represents a distinct conception of the relationship between race and cinema gillespie recasts the idea of black film and poses new paradigms for genre narrative aesthetics historiography and intertextuality

technologies re abstract trauma in complex ways approaching trauma in its cultural forms this book considers how technologies of trauma in the guise of cultural artefacts presents moral and ethical challenges from the vernacular of storytelling and witnessing to livestreaming of terror today

this interdisciplinary study sees press photographs of the blm movement in the us as

agents for black liberation close reading both the images and theoretical considerations on blackness photography and the often intangible articulations of racism in today's society the book focuses on the work the photographs do for the movement as they politically garner attention and create discursive places historically unsettle seemingly fixed narratives about the african american past and virtually establish room for digital activist debate based on azoulay's event of photography and ranci re's politics of aesthetics it builds the theory of an attentive reading of photography and addresses the larger frameworks of photography as event in anti racist considerations in their political aesthetic and performative dimensions these photographs negotiate the current matter of black lives in the united states and articulate ontological dimensions of blackness as political struggle and affirmative position they become mobile and material discursive places that lift the protested debates into wider fields of consideration and visibility complicating notions of society politics and interaction

this international collection presents theoretical empirical and practice led considerations of what can be envisioned as visual pedagogies offering classic creative and contemporary re workings of these paradigms in complementary yet

overlapping parts this book explores understandings of visual pedagogies as learning with through and or about images visual and digital environments embodied performances and immersive experiences as visual practices in academia gain momentum the need to navigate visuality in ways that enhance sensibility and awareness of how what we observe analyze criticize and reflect on in any given moment continues to grow we understand visual pedagogies as nomadic in the sense that the how and the what of image centered learning is not separable what does this mean first it means recognizing pedagogical practices as always already implicated in other words the form itself carries its own message visual pedagogies respond to and are actualized within the cultural contexts in which they are working at the same time they carry the possibilities of being taken up in diverse ways beyond one particular context as living morphing practices visual pedagogies expand on contextual affordances while at the same time providing the means of exceeding them thus there are folk literacies in perpetual movement that are producing visual pedagogies where points of traction for theorizing and research can form these then can be mobilized as springboards for analysis and examination of how visual pedagogies become apparent this book takes up multiple diverse contexts through an international selection of authors the parts work to address conceptual empirical and practical considerations through different emphases yet in conversation with each other

black ephemera explores the crisis and the challenge of the black musical archive in a moment when black american culture has become a global import yet the cultural dna of that culture is becoming obscured in the transformation from analog to digital

in on racial icons nicole r fleetwood focuses a sustained look on photography in documenting black public life exploring the ways in which iconic images function as celebrations of national and racial progress at times or as a gauge of collective racial wounds in moments of crisis

the image and the witness trauma memory and visual culture is a timely interdisciplinary collection of original essays concerning the ethical stakes of the image in our visually saturated age it explores the role of the material image in bearing witness to historical events and the visual representation of witnesses to collective trauma in arguing for the agency of the image this unique collection debates post traumatic memory documentary ethics embodied vision and the recycling of images it discusses works by chris marker errol morris derek jarman doris salcedo gerhard richter and boris mikhailov along with images from popular culture including websites and home movies

latin blackness in parisian visual culture 1852 1932 examines an understudied visual language used to portray latin americans in mid 19th to early 20th century parisian popular visual media the term latinize is introduced to connect france s early 19th century endeavors to create latin america an expansion of the french empire into the latin language based spanish and portuguese americas to its perception of this population latin american elites traveler to paris in the 1840s from their newly independent nations were denigrated in representations rather than depicted as equals in a developing global economy darkened skin etched onto images of latin americans of european descent mitigated their ability to claim the privileges of their ancestral heritage whitened skin among other codes imposed on turn of the 20th century black latin americans in paris tempered their blackness and rendered them relatively assimilatable compared to colonial africans blacks from the caribbean and african americans after identifying mid to late 19th century latinizing codes the study focuses on shifts in latinizing visuality between 1890 1933 in three case studies the depictions of popular cuban circus entertainer chocolat representations of panamanian world bantamweight champion boxer alfonso teofilo brown and paintings of black uruguayans executed by pedro figari a uruguayan artist during his residence in paris between 1925 1933

speaking of people ebony jet and contemporary art explores the ways contemporary artists use ebony and jet as a resource and as inspiration in their

practices published by johnson publishing company for over sixty years both magazines are cultural touchstones for many african americans and often represent a commonality between people of diverse backgrounds considering ebony and jet from a variety of perspectives as journalistic material and important documenters of black life as metaphor for african american culture and as theoretical spaces for black thought and exchange the exhibition examines the magazines material and cultural legacy as artists perceive them while much of the work in the exhibition utilizes ebony and jet imagery and text as source material for some the concept of these iconic publications and their institutional histories provides the starting point for artistic production as popular widely circulated print publications the magazines ushered in a particular phenomenon of collection and display in black domestic spaces somewhat analogously many of the artists included in speaking of people maintain their own personal archives of these iconic publications the first exhibition devoted to this topic speaking of people features over thirty works by a multi generational interdisciplinary group of sixteen artists speaking of people includes photography painting sculpture and sound works that will occupy the museum s main galleries and project space artists in the exhibition include noel anderson jeremy okai davis godfried donkor ellen gallagher theaster gates lyle ashton harris david hartt leslie hewitt glenn ligon kerry james marshall ayanah moor lorna simpson martine syms hank willis thomas mickalene thomas and purvis young accompanying the exhibition will be a fully illustrated exhibition catalogue with essays by assistant curator lauren haynes scholars siobhan carter david romi crawford and elizabeth alexander artist hank willis thomas as well as a foreword by studio museum director and chief curator thelma golden the publication is designed by the original champions of design new york

blackness has always played a central role in the american imagination therefore it should not be surprising that popular television a medium that grew up with the civil rights movement has featured blackness as both a foil and a key narrative theme throughout its sixty year existence ironically in modern colorblind times we are faced with a unique turn of events blackness is actually over represented in television sitcoms and dramas channeling blackness studies on television and race in america presents fifteen classic and contemporary studies of the shifting complex

relationship between popular television and blackness using a variety of methodological and theoretical approaches these essays examine four key issues that have framed popular and scholarly inquiries into the nature of race on television the black white binary the power of media distinguishing between negative and positive images the relative importance of markets versus racial motives in television firmly establishing popular television as a central cultural forum in our society channeling blackness looks at how television has profoundly shaped and been shaped by america s ambivalent relationship with blackness it provides numerous examples of how our current interaction with television distinguishes the lived experiences of today from those of the past the book also shows how the entertainment function of television often masks its ideological purpose particularly its role in reflecting and reproducing america s racial order a useful supplement in any number of courses on race and society channeling blackness is an ideal text for advanced undergraduate and graduate courses on race and media media and society television studies television criticism communication studies and african american and ethnic studies

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
